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immediate damage without suicidal intent, and the purpose is not culturally sanctioned.

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Nonsuicidal self injury (NSSI) is more common in adolescent and young adult populations than previously thought. Although it is important to assess the associated risk of suicidal behavior, NSSI is generally used to cope with distressing negative affective states, especially anger and depression, and mixed emotional states.

Nonsuicidal Self injury in Adolescents

Presence of depression or anxiety; Feelings of worthlessness; Because of these and other risk factors, the presence of non-suicidal self-injury is, in and of itself, a risk factor for suicidal thoughts and behaviors. Non-suicidal self-injury is typically used as a coping strategy for preserving and enhancing life, not ending one's life.

Existing research suggests that many well established risk factors for suicide (such as depression, hopelessness, and impulsivity) do not predict suicide attempts among adolescents who have suicidal thoughts or engage in non-suicidal self-harm.

Fear of harming oneself when not depressed and/or wanting to die may be due to suicidal obsessions in OCD, or suicidal OCD. This is different from suicidal thoughts due to depression or a desire to end one's suffering because of physical illness or injury.

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Cutting is frequently linked to a history of childhood abuse (especially sexual abuse) and is also commonly associated with borderline personality disorder.
