The nurse has a variety of roles in Hildegard Peplau's nursing theory. The six main roles are: stranger, teacher, resource person, counselor, surrogate, and leader. As a stranger, the nurse receives the patient in the same way the patient meets a stranger in other life situations. The nurse should create an environment that builds trust.
